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Sightings of Rare and Uncommon Birds in the North Okanagan — October and November 2023

TEMPERATURES continued several degrees higher than average temperatures for years past and as a result almost all water bodies stayed completely or at least partially ice-free

throughout Nov. However, open water did not attract high numbers of water birds. Forest birds seemed fewer than usual without almost no "northern" finches evident.

These sight records were gathered from Cornell's online database, eBird

Snow Goose: very uncommon migrant, but increasing in the Okanagan Valley in the past three

decades. Two records – an ad. at Kalamalka beach 1 Nov. (CS) and 9 ads.and 4 juvs. along Otter L. Rd. 4 Nov. (CS).

Cackling Goose: very uncommon migrant. Singles were scattered through the period at Swan and Rawlings Lakes among Canada Geese flocks. A flock of five at Kalamalka Beach was discovered 25 Oct. (ST, CS) and lingered in area until 1 Nov. (CS). Other sightings: 3 at Rawlings L. 3 Nov. (ST, CS); 1

at Rawlings L. 16 Nov. (ST), and 5 at Kalamalka beach 23 Nov. (LMc).

Green-winged Teal: Although a common species, it's of interest to note peak numbers. The highest count this month was of 151 at the marsh at the north end of Otter Lake (CS). By 28 Nov. the count had dwindled to 20 (CS).

Long-tailed Duck: rare migrant. Female at Otter L. 18 Nov. (KN) and 19 Nov. (CS, ST).

Common Merganser: locally abundant fall migrant. Large concentrations of 1000 or more are an almost annual late fall event on Swan L. This Nov. no survey of the whole of Swan L. was carried out but 294 were counted on Rose's Pond 12 Nov. (CS) and 700 were estimated on Goose L. 9 Nov. (CS).

Ruddy Duck: common summer resident. Migrant flock of 28 off Kalavista boat launch 25 Oct. (CS). Late record: nine females and/or juvs.at Rawlings L. (CS, ST).

California Quail: common resident. An unusually late brood of at least 6 half-grown chicks plus adults at Rawlings L. 3 Nov. (ST, CS).

(Okanagan Landing) off Kin Beach (CS, m. obs.) Mostly absent elsewhere.

American Golden-Plover: Rare migrant. A juv. appeared at Otter L. marsh 1 Oct. (CS, ST).

Long-billed Dowitcher: with the autumn's mild temperatures and mostly ice-free ponds and lakes, Long-bills (2) lingered at Rawlings L. until 14 Nov. (ST).



Bonaparte's Gull: Local migrant. Usually appear in flocks on Swan Lake during October. This fall only singles or twosomes were detected, suggesting the bulk of migrants bypassed the North Okanagan. Sightings: Two at Coyote Crossing Pond 1 Oct. (CS); one at Otter L. marsh on 16 Oct. (CS), and one at the mouth of Vernon Ck., Okanagan Landing 11 Nov. (MM).

Black-legged Kittiwake: a salt-water gull breeding in large colonies along the outer coasts of North America and spending its non-breeding time over pelagic waters. A first for the North Okanagan checklist (and a

second for the Okanagan Valley) was an immature on Swan L. 10 Nov. (CS). An immature had been photographed in the Shuswap about a week earlier and was probably the same bird.

Say's Phoebe: common summer resident. One lingering on Middleton Mt. 8 Nov. (JVD).

Violet-green Swallow: Common summer resident. As usual this was the last swallow species to depart.

above: A new addition to the Okanagan checklist was this first-year Great Black-backed Gull, only the third to ever be recorded for B.C.(normally found along the north Atlantic coasts). This individual delighted birders by appeared first at Penticton on 6 Dec. 2023 where discovered by Chris Charlesworth and Ryan Tomlinson, and later that month relocating to Vernon and Kelowna.

Red-necked Grebe: common migrant, very local and uncommon in late fall and winter. Concentration of 15-55 found throughout the month on Vernon Bay

Latest record for this season was of five along Kidston Rd. 2 Oct. (CS).

Hermit Thrush: common boreal summer resident. Rare migrant through the lowlands. One at 467 Potter Rd. 24 Nov. (JVD).

Swainson's Thrush: common summer resident. The latest sighting this season was one at Polson Park 2 Oct. (CS).

Bohemian Waxwing: Common winter resident. Bohemians arrived very early in the Valley with a flock of 50 over 6131 Silver Star Rd. 10 Oct. (CS). Thereafter flocks tended to be smaller than usual (50 or fewer) and uncommon throughout the period.

Gray-crowned Rosy-Finch: rare irruptive fall and winter visitor from alpine zones. Only one rec. this season. One with Snow Buntings on Middleton Mt. 28 Oct. (MM).

Cassin's Finch: fairly common summer resident but given to unpredictable population irruptions and dispersals from year to year. This autumn the species was decidedly rare. One was in JVD's yard 4 Nov. and another was seen at Pemberton Rd., Lumby 26 Nov. (ST).

Chipping Sparrow: common summer resident. Formerly thought to depart the N.Okanagan in Sept. However, surveys of roadside bushes along Whitevale Road near Headgates Rd. (Whitevale silage pit) revealed about 5-20 Chipping Sparrows each day from the first week of Oct. to 19 Oct. (ST).

Snow Bunting: very uncommon spring and fall migrant. Fairly well-defined migration window: late Oct. through early Nov. One at Swan L. N. Park 28

Oct. (CS); 14 the same date on Middleton Mtn. (MM); 5 at Rawlings L. 3 Nov. (ST, CS).

Fox Sparrow: uncommon to common summer resident in the upper edge of the boreal forest on surrounding mountains. Very rare migrant spring and summer in lowlands. Summer race is the Slate-coloured Fox Sparrow. BC/Alaska coastal races termed Sooty Fox Sparrow. Two records this fall: a possible Sooty at Swan L.N. Park 1 Nov. (MM), one along Whitevale Rd. 15 Oct. (ST).

Golden-crowned Sparrow: rare migrant. Immature at Polson Park boardwalk 2 Oct. (CS).

Rare & Uncommon Birds continued:

Harris's Sparrow: very rare migrant and rare winter visitor. Seldom encountered in migration. One immature at Coldstream Cemetery 15 Oct. (ST, CS).

Swamp Sparrow: not detected in the Okanagan Valley until late winter of 1987. Now a regular but rare fall migrant and very scarce winter resident. ST encountered up to 5 a day among the cattail beds of Rawlings Lake in Oct. Late record is one at Swan L. N. Park 16 Nov. (LMc).

White-throated Sparrow: increasing migrant and winter resident. Oct.-Nov. 2023 was a poor time for this species. The largest concentration was of 6 at Polson Park boardwalk 2 Oct. (CS).

Spotted Towhee: common summer resident. Fairly uncommon and local winter resident in small numbers. This fall towhees began to become hard to find in Sept.-Oct. and in Nov. only 2-3 were found for the month. This is a highly unusual and unexplained development.

Yellow-headed Blackbird: common though local summer resident. Rare in winter. One among the Brewer's Blackbirds at Coldstream Ranch feed lots at 20 Oct. (CS). Later two were found by ST

Brown-headed Cowbird: common summer resident. Rare in winter. Two were among the blackbirds at Coldstream Ranch feedlots throughout Nov. (ST).

Rusty Blackbird: Rare migrant and winter visitor. JVD and ST located one at the Coldstream Ranch

feed lot 16 Oct. and it was seen several times thereafter throughout the period.

Yellow-rumped Warbler: common summer resident. Very common spring and fall migrant through the valley. Only two Nov. records: one along Salmon Trail, Lumby, 5 Nov. (LMc); 1 at 467 Pottery Rd. 27 Nov. (JVD).

Wilson's Warbler: uncommon boreal forest summer resident. Very rare late autumn straggler. Three sightings: One at Coldstream Cemetery 19 Oct. (MM); one at Polson Park 16 Nov. (MM) and 18 Nov. (CS).
